Returned Peace Corps Volunteers can receive substantial financial aid to pursue over 300 types of master's or doctorate degrees in a wide variety of subject areas through the Coverdell Fellows Program.

Returned Volunteers have lifetime eligibility for the program and may choose to participate as soon as they successfully complete Peace Corps service.

Coverdell Fellows receive scholarships and participate in professional internships in underserved American communities, helping them prepare for careers in a wide range of disciplines.

FELLOWSHIP BENEFITS

Financial Assistance: Receive financial aid that may include tuition reduction, a full scholarship, or stipend.

Professional Experience: Apply what is learned in the classroom to a professional setting.

Helping Others: Provide much-needed assistance to underserved communities in the United States.

Federal Employment: Extend noncompetitive eligibility status, which eases the hiring process for federal employment for up to three years as a full-time student. Visit peacecorps.gov/nce for more information.
